BALLOT MEASURES
PUBLIC QUESTION #1

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO DEDICATE ASSESSMENTS ON WAGES BY THE
STATE TO THE PAYMENT OF EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

Shall the amendment to Article VIII, Section II of the State Constitution, agreed to by the Legislature, which: prohibits collection by the State of assessments based solely on employee wages and salaries for any purpose other than providing employee benefits; dedicates all employer and employee contributions collected for any employee benefit fund, and all returns on investments of those contributions, to the purpose of that fund; and prohibits any transferring, borrowing, appropriating or using of those contributions or returns for any other purpose, be approved?

This proposed constitutional amendment prohibits the collection by the State of assessments based on employee wages and salaries for any purpose except paying employee benefits (or making other employee-authorized or federally required payments, in the case of the State's own employees), dedicates all contributions made to the unemployment compensation fund, the State disability benefits fund, or any other employee benefit fund, and all returns on investments of those contributions, to the purpose of that fund, and prohibits the use of those contributions or returns for any other purpose. The requirements of this proposed amendment do not apply to the

gross income tax, which is exclusively dedicated by the Constitution to the purpose of reducing or offsetting local property taxes.

This ballot measure passed.

AUTHORIZING LEGISLATURE BY LAW TO ALLOW WAGERING ON SPORTS EVENTS
AT ATLANTIC CITY CASINOS AND AT HOSE RACETRACKS

Shall the amendment to Article IV, Section VII, paragraph 2 of the Constitution of the State of New Jersey, agreed to by the Legislature, providing that it shall be lawful for the Legislature to authorize by law wagering at casinos or gambling houses in Atlantic City and at current or

former running and harness horse racetracks on the results of professional, certain college, or amateur sport or athletic events, be approved?

A “Yes” vote on this question would allow the Legislature, when permitted by federal law, to legalize the placing of bets on certain sports events at casinos, racetracks, and former racetrack sites. Currently, federal law only permits this type of betting in Nevada and Delaware. It also occurs through illegal betting operations. If legalized in New Jersey, bets could be placed on professional, college, or amateur sports or athletic events, except that bets could not be placed on any college sports or athletic event that takes place in New Jersey or in which a New Jersey college team is playing.

This ballot measure passed.

BUILDING OUR FUTURE BOND ACT

Do you approve the “Building Our Future Bond Act”? This bond act authorizes principal amount of \$750 million to provide matching grants to New Jersey’s colleges and universities. Money from the grants will be used to build, equip and expand higher education facilities for the purpose of increasing academic capacity.

Approval of this act will allow the State to issue bonds in the total principal amount of \$750 million. Proceeds from the bonds will be used to provide grants to New Jersey's public and private colleges and universities to construct and equip higher education buildings to increase academic capacity. Bond proceeds will be allocated as follows:

- \$300 million for public research universities;
- \$247.5 million for State colleges and other State universities;
- \$150 million for county colleges; and
- \$52.5 million for private institutions with an endowment of \$1 billion or less.

Public and private colleges and universities which receive grants will be required to provide funds to support 25% of a project.

This ballot measure passed.

PUBLIC QUESTION #2

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ALLOWING CONTRIBUTIONS TO BE TAKEN FROM JUSTICES' AND JUDGES' SALARIES FOR THEIR EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS
Do you approve an amendment to the New Jersey Constitution, as agreed to by the Legislature, to allow contributions set by law to be taken from the salaries of Supreme Court Justices and Superior Court Judges for their employee benefits?

This amendment clarifies the Legislature's authority to pass laws requiring contributions be taken from the salaries of Supreme Court Justices and Superior Court Judges for their employee benefits. These benefits include their pension and health care coverage.

The amendment responds to a question raised in a 2011 lawsuit filed by a judge after the Legislature passed and the Governor signed into law P.L.2011, c.78. That law increased the contributions taken from current and future justices' and judges' salaries for their benefit, starting in October 2011. The lawsuit, which was appealed to the New Jersey Supreme Court, argued against taking the higher contributions from currently appointed justices and judges, citing language in the Constitution that their salaries cannot be reduced during their appointed terms.

The amendment clarifies that such contributions, set by law, may be taken from justices' and judges' salaries during their terms. It would also allow for the higher contributions set by P.L.2011, c. 78 to be deducted from current and future justices' and judges' salaries.

This ballot measure passed.

LEGISLATION

There was no legislation passed in the State of New Jersey between the 2012 primary election and the 2012 general election related to the electoral or voting processes.

EXTENUATING CIRCUMSTANCES

Hurricane Sandy hit the state of State of New Jersey in late October 2012. Due to the damage and displacement caused by the deadly storm, New Jersey allowed voters to cast their ballot electronically, as many people were unable to get to their polling place. Election officials were

unprepared for the overwhelming response of displaced and non-displaced voters wishing to vote electronically, so voting was extended until 8PM on Friday, November 9, with requests to vote by mail needing to be sent by 5PM that day.

CHANGES

Electronic voting was available to voters in New Jersey as a result of displacement caused by Hurricane Sandy. Additionally, the deadline to vote was changed to November 9 to give voters more time to cast their ballots electronically, as glitches in the new system would have otherwise lowered turnout. Election results were also delayed as a result of the hurricane, due to an increase in provisional ballots cast.

Do you approve amending the Constitution to allow veterans' organizations to use money collected from existing games of chance to support their organizations?

This amendment to the Constitution would allow veterans' organizations to use the money collected from existing games of chance (such as bingo, lotto, or raffles) to support their organizations. At present, the Constitution allows this money to be used only for educational, charitable, patriotic, religious or public-spirited purposes. Currently, only senior citizen groups may use the money they collect from existing games of chance to support their groups.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO SET A STATE MINIMUM WAGE WITH ANNUAL COST OF LIVING INCREASES

This amendment to the State Constitution sets the State minimum wage at the level in effect under current law, or \$8.25 per hour, whichever is more. Cost of living increases would be added each year. Also, if the federal minimum wage rate is raised above the State rate, the State rate would be raised to match the federal rate. Future cost of living increases then would be added to that raised rate.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO ALLOW A COURT TO ORDER PRETRAIL
DETENTION OF A PERSON IN A CRIMINAL CASE**

Do you approve amending the Constitution to allow a court to order pretrial detention of a person in a criminal case? This would change the current constitutional right to bail.

The change to the Constitution would mean that a court could order that a person remain in jail prior to trial, even without a chance for the person to post bail, in some situations.

The amendment also removes language in the Constitution about bail eligibility for death penalty cases. The death penalty no longer exists in New Jersey.

The Constitution currently requires a court to grant bail to a jailed person in a criminal case before trial. If the person posts bail, the person is released from jail pending trial.

The amendment would give a court the option of ordering a person to remain in jail in some situations. The court order such detention based upon concerns that person, if released: will not return to court; is a threat to the safety of another person or the community; or will obstruct or attempt to obstruct the criminal justice process.

The amendment authorizes the Legislature to pass laws concerning pretrial release and pretrial detention. The amendment would take effect on January 1, 2017 to allow any new laws to be enacted and their requirements to be established.

The amendment would also remove language in the Constitution about bail eligibility for death penalty cases. The death penalty no longer exists in New Jersey.

This ballot measure passed.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT DEDICATED STATE FUNDS FOR OPEN SPACE, FARMLAND, AND HISTORIC PRESERVATION, AND CHANGING EXISTING DEDICATION FOR WATER PROGRAMS, UNDERGROUND STORAGE TANKS, AND HAZARDOUS SITE CLEANUPS

Do you approve amending the Constitution to dedicate certain State revenues each year for environmental programs?

The Constitution now dedicates four percent of the money collected from the Corporation Business Tax to help pay for some environmental programs. This amendment raises the amount from four percent to six percent beginning on July 1, 2019.

The amendment also changes, beginning July 1, 2015, some of the programs funded by the current dedication. The new dedication would be used to improve water quality, remove and clean up underground tanks, and clean up polluted sites. Lastly, the amendment dedicates money received from leases and other uses of State open space lands to pay for open space, farmland, and historic preservation.

This amendment would ensure stable funding for some of the State's environmental programs.

The Constitution now dedicates four percent of the money collected from the Corporation Business Tax to help pay for some environmental programs. This amendment raises the amount from four percent to six percent beginning on July 1, 2019. It also changes the amounts allocated to some of the programs funded by the existing dedication beginning on July 1, 2015.

The money from the new dedication would be used: (1) to preserve and care for open space (Green Acres), farmland, historic sites, and flood-prone areas (Blue Acres); (2) to improve water quality; (3) to pay for polluted site cleanups; and (4) for underground tank removal and cleanup. Lastly, the amendment requires that money received from leases and certain other uses of State-owned preserved open space be used to pay for open space, farmland, and historic preservation.

The current dedication of Corporation Business Tax revenue helps pay for water quality programs, polluted site cleanups, underground tank removal and cleanup, air pollution equipment for diesel engines, and improvements to park.

Under the State's open space preservation programs, known as Green Acres and Blue Acres, land is bought to protect water supplies, create and maintain parks and fish and wildlife areas,

and protect flood-prone areas. The Green Acres program also helps pay for improvements to parks.

This ballot measure passed.

BALLOT MEASURES
PUBLIC QUESTION #1

Do you approve amending the Constitution to permit casino gambling in two additional counties in this State? At present, casino gambling is allowed only in Atlantic City in Atlantic County. Only one casino in each of the two counties would be permitted. Each casino is to be located in a town that is at least 72 miles from Atlantic City. The amendment would allow certain persons to apply first for a casino license.

This ballot measure did not pass.

MUNICIPAL QUESTION #1 – MILLVILLE

Shall a charter commission be elected to study the charter of the City of Millville and to consider a new charter or improvements to the present charter and to make recommendation thereon?

This ballot measure did not pass.

PUBLIC QUESTION #2

Do you approve amending the Constitution to dedicate all revenue from the State motor fuels tax and petroleum products gross receipts tax to the Transportation Trust Fund?

This amendment would provide that an additional three cents of the current motor fuels tax on diesel fuel, which is not dedicated for transportation purposes, be dedicated to the Transportation Trust Fund. In doing so, the entire State tax on diesel fuel would be used for transportation purposes. The entire State tax on gasoline is currently dedicated to the Transportation Trust Fund and used for transportation purposes.

The amendment would also provide that all of the revenue from the current State tax on petroleum products gross receipts be dedicated to the Transportation Trust Fund. In doing so, the entire State tax on petroleum products gross receipts would be used for transportation purposes.

This amendment does not change the current tax on motor fuels or petroleum products gross receipts.

This ballot measure passed.

LEGISLATION

P.L.2015, c.27 (S2099) – Places two year moratorium on moving date of Type II school district's annual school election from day of general election in November back to third Tuesday in April; creates study commission.

EXTENUATING CIRCUMSTANCES

While there were no extenuating circumstances that influenced the process in which the 2016 general election was carried out in regards to voting, it was eventually concluded that there was foreign interference at play leading up to the election. This interference came from the Russian

government, who sought to undermine the democratic process in the United States by igniting social and political unrest among ideological factions. The interference came in the form of thousands of social media accounts, with a particularly large presence on Facebook Twitter, and Instagram, that took the image of Americans and used this image to spread disinformation. This disinformation campaign was largely in favor of Donald J. Trump and in opposition to Hillary Rodham Clinton, which may have had some effect on the outcome of the election. Following the election, a Special Council, led by special prosecutor Robert Mueller, confirmed that Russian interference did occur, but did not find evidence that Trump's campaign had participated in collusion with the Russian government in order to win the election.

**BALLOT MEASURES
PUBLIC QUESTION #1**

Do you approve the “Securing Our Children’s Future Bond Act”? This bond act authorizes the State to issue bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$500 million. The money from the sale of the bonds would be used to provide grants to schools, school districts, county vocational school districts and county colleges. Money from the grants would be used to build, equip, and expand facilities to increase career and technical education program capacity Money would also be used for school security upgrades and school district water infrastructure improvement projects.

This ballot measure passed.

ADVISORY NON-BINDING REFERENDUM QUESTION #1 – BRIDGETON

Should the City of Bridgeton allow retail facilities of recreational marijuana to operate within city limits? This question is not binding.

This ballot measure did not pass.

ADVISORY NON-BINDING REFERENDUM QUESTION #2 – BRIDGETON

Should the City of Bridgeton allow operation of facilities that cultivate and/or distribute to retail facilities of recreational marijuana within city limits? This question is not binding.

This ballot measure did not pass.

ADVISORY NON-BINDING REFERENDUM QUESTION #3 – BRIDGETON

If the City of Bridgeton does allow facilities that cultivate, distribute and/or retail facilities of recreational marijuana, should these facilities be confined to areas zoned “industrial”? This question is not binding.

This non-binding referendum seeks to gauge public sentiment regarding whether or not to allow businesses and/or facilities that cultivate, distribute, or offer for retail sale; marijuana or products derived from marijuana to operate within the city limits and if so, whether these businesses and/or facilities should be confined to only those areas of the city that are zoned for industrial use.

This ballot measure passed.

MUNICIPAL QUESTION #1 – DOWNE

Do you favor the issuance of a Plenary Retail Consumption Liquor License for the sale of liquor in the Township of Downe?

This ballot measure did not pass.

MUNICIPAL QUESTION #1 – VINELAND

Shall the rate of the tax annually levied for the support of the free public library in the City of Vineland be increased from 0.033 cents per \$100 of assessed equalized value of real property to 0.050 cents per \$100 of assessed equalized value of real property?

Under current law, a municipality with a free public library is required to annually raise by taxation a sum equal to one-third mill on every dollar of assessable property. The current sum raised, and minimum amount required, is \$1,375,349.

With this proposal, submitted by petition of registered Vineland voters to the governing body, the new sum total for support of the free public library would be \$2,063,025. The proposed change in the amount to be annually raised by taxation for the support of the free public library is \$687,676.

The effect of the proposed change on the property taxes of a residential property assessed at the average assessed value of residential properties in Vineland, for a property valued at \$159,402, would be an increase of \$28.68 annually, for a total annual library tax for that average valued property of \$86.04.

If the voters approve this binding proposition, the new rate would be in effect for a 10-year period.

This ballot measure did not pass.

MUNICIPAL QUESTION #2 – VINELAND

Shall the City of Vineland permit the siting of medical marijuana cultivation and dispensary alternative treatment centers within the geographic boundaries of Vineland?

The governing body of the City of Vineland is gauging public opinion with this non-binding referendum.

This referendum is limited to medicinal marijuana. It does not involve recreational marijuana. The “New Jersey Compassionate Use Medical Marijuana Act” provides for a limited number of medicinal marijuana alternative treatment centers throughout the state. The facilities are regulated, registered and sited by the New Jersey Department of Health and Human Services. Medical marijuana has been determined to be beneficial in treating or alleviating pain or other symptoms associated with certain debilitating medical conditions. Patients and primary caregivers are strictly regulated to qualify for certification to obtain medical marijuana from prescribing physicians.

This ballot measure passed.

LEGISLATION

P.L.2018, c.66 (S1974) – Requires petitions of nomination of candidates for State, county, school, or municipal elective public office to include functioning e-mail addresses therefore.

P.L.2018, c.72 (S647) – Permits registered voters to receive mail-in ballots automatically for all elections under certain conditions.

P.L.2018, c. 110 (A3463) – Requires district boards of election to report every two hours number of voters who have voted at each precinct; authorizes challengers to request reported count.

EXTENUATING CIRCUMSTANCES

There were no extenuating circumstances that impacted this election.

CHANGES

There were no changes made to the electoral or voting processes that impacted in-person voting during this election; however, P.L.2018, c.72 allowed voters to automatically receive a mail-in ballot for all elections, as long as certain conditions are met.

EXECUTIVE ORDERS

E.O. 120 – Governor Murphy announces postponement of June 2nd primary elections until July 7th.

E.O. 144 – Governor Murphy signs executive order to protect public health by mailing every registered voter a VBM ballot or application ahead of the primary election.

EXTENUATING CIRCUMSTANCES

The COVID-19 Pandemic, which began to fully take effect in the United States in March 2020, greatly modified the way in which the 2020 Primary Election took place.

CHANGES

The 2020 Primary Election was greatly impacted by the COVID-19 Pandemic. As a result of this, the date of the election was changed from June 2, 2020 to July 7, 2020. To try to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 at the polls, voters were each automatically sent a mail-in ballot. While the Board of Elections could receive the ballots after the election, they had to be postmarked on or before 8 p.m. on July 7, and the absolute latest they could be received was July 14. If a voter did not want to mail their ballot through the postal system, they had the option of leaving it in one of at least five secure ballot drop boxes across the county. If the voter preferred to wait until Election Day to vote in person, they were able to vote on a provisional ballot. There was a minimum of one polling location per municipality open for in-person voting, with at least 50% countywide available. Also, no sample ballots were sent to voters.

PUBLIC QUESTION #1

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO LEGALIZE MARIJUANA

Do you approve amending the Constitution to legalize a controlled form of marijuana called “cannabis”?

Only adults at least 21 years of age could use cannabis. The State commission created to oversee the State’s medical cannabis program would also oversee the new, personal use cannabis market.

Cannabis products would be subject to the State sales tax. If authorized by the Legislature, a municipality may pass a local ordinance to charge a local tax on cannabis products.

This ballot measure passed.

PUBLIC QUESTION #2

PROPERTY TAX DEDUCTION AND EXEMPTION FOR PEACETIME VETERANS

Do you approve amending the Constitution to give a \$250 property tax deduction to veterans who did not serve in time of war? Do you also approve amending the Constitution to give a 100 percent property tax exemption to certain totally disabled veterans who did not serve in time of war?

The widow or widower of these veterans also would receive this \$250 deduction or 100 percent exemption after the veteran’s death.

This ballot measure passed.

PUBLIC QUESTION #3

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO CHANGE THE LEGISLATIVE REDISTRICTING SCHEDULE IF CENSUS DATA IS DELAYED

Do you approve amending the Constitution to change when new legislative districts are created if the federal census data is delayed?

The current COVID-19 pandemic has delayed census data collection. If New Jersey does not receive the census data in a timely manner, new legislative districts may not be ready in time for State legislative elections in the year ending in one.

This change to the redistricting schedule will allow legislators to be elected that year from their existing districts for their two-year term in office. The new districts will be used starting with the next scheduled general election for the State legislature.

This ballot measure passed.

LEGISLATION

P.L.2020, c.70 (A4276) – Establishes “The Ballot Cure Act” to modify and establish various voting procedures.

P.L.2020, c.71 (A4320) – Extends ballot receipt and election certification deadlines; increases certain messenger and bearer ballot limits: requires certain information to increase public awareness and use of voting by mail.

P.L.2020, c.72 (A4475) – Requires county boards of election to establish ballot drop boxes in each county at least 45 days before election: revises procedures concerning mail-in ballots for 2020 general election.

EXECUTIVE ORDERS

E.O. 177 – Governor Murphy signs executive order to protect public health by mailing every active registered voter a VBM ballot ahead of the general election.

E.O. 179 – Governor Murphy signed an executive order to make modifications to this year’s primarily vote-by-mail (VBM) general election.

E.O. 198 – Governor Murphy signs executive order extending certain election-related deadlines.

EXTENUATING CIRCUMSTANCES

The COVID-19 Pandemic, which began to fully take effect in the United States in March 2020, greatly modified the way in which the 2020 General Election took place.

CHANGES

Voting in the 2020 General Election was conducted almost entirely by mail. Rather than turning out at the polls on Election Day, voters all automatically received a mail-in ballot prior to November 3, 2020. They had the option to mail their ballot to the Board of Elections using the postal service, take it directly to the Board of Elections, place it in one of eleven drop boxes throughout the county, or take it to their polling place on Election Day and vote it then. If a voter did not want to vote by mail or did not bring their ballot to the polls on Election Day, they were able to vote provisionally; however, there were only a limited number of polling places actually open on November 3. Voting machines were only utilized by voters with a disability.

This grant allowed New Jersey to expand access to mail-in voting, online registration, and ensure the safety of those that went to the polls on Election Day.

Center for Tech and Civic Life

The Center for Tech and Civic Life, also known as CTCL, is a nonprofit that aims to increase civic engagement in elections around the United States. In September of 2020, Mark Zuckerberg and Priscilla Chan donated \$250 million to the organization, which would ultimately go toward funding assistance to local election offices. Aid from this grant went toward ensuring in-person voting on Election Day was safe and efficient, expanding voter education, recruiting and training polls workers, and increasing the ability of mail-in voting.

FEDERAL ELECTION LEGISLATION

HELP AMERICA VOTE ACT (HAVA)

The Help America Vote Act, also known as HAVA, is a federal election reform law passed in 2002 to provide funds to assist states in upgrading the equipment used to vote and set standards for voting procedures to protect and ensure the accuracy of individual's votes and the democratic process in the United States. The goals of this act include replacing outdated and faulty equipment, allowing voters an opportunity to correct their ballot before it is cast, and establishing national standards for election administration. In 2020, \$400 million in HAVA funding was granted by the CARES Act, to provide financial assistance to states to be used to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 at polling places by expanding mail-in voting and taking proper precautions to protect voters who chose to cast their ballots in person.

NATIONAL VOTER REGISTRATION ACT

The National Voter Registration Act of 1993, also known as NVRA, is a federal election law passed with the goal of increasing nationwide voter registration. Commonly referred to as the "Motor Voter" law, this act requires state governments to allow citizens to register to vote through a simplified process when they apply for or renew their driver's license. This law also requires public assistance programs to provide voter registration assistance to their clients.
